Rainy Season Safety

High Water...Stay Out

After a big rain, big puddles look like neat play places to children. The subtle dangers inherent in these situations have led to tragedies in the region. Drainage culverts can produce a powerful sucking force during periods of high water. Moving water as shallow as 8" can move a vehicle. There is no way to know the dangers that lay out of sight just below the surface of the water. Don't let children get carried away because of their excitement.

The Obio State Division of Natural Resources reports that water traveling 6 mph exerts 67.2 pounds of force on the legs and a whopping 134 pounds of force on the body.

Downed Wires...Stay Away


Storms will knock electrical wires down. In these situations high voltage wires may arc, spark, crackle, and burn anything they touch. This will continue until the power company shuts them off. Downed wires should be considered dangerous even if they show no signs of electrical current-they can arc and jump without warning. If you are in a car or structure which has a downed electrical line touching it-stay put. If you observe a downed line, call the power company. While the MFPD cannot shut the power off and cannot take any action to suppress a fire as long as a downed line is powered, the MFPD will respond to help protect residents and assist in any way possible.

Weather Alert...Stay Tuned

The Community Alert Sirens are activated when there is a tornado, chemical spill, or other life-threatening event. When you hear the wailing sirens go indoors and turn on a radio or television. The nature of the danger and guidance for your safety

> will be provided through the media. If you have an emergency, call 911; otherwise, stay

The MFPD is funded through a state regulated formula which is applied to the property value of homes and business structures in the district.
